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



NEONATAL ABSTINENCE SYNDROME (NAS)

NAS is a withdrawal syndrome in newborns following birth that is primarily caused by maternal opiate use during the prenatal period.

HOW ARE WE DOING?

There were 2,323 cases of NAS identified in Delaware during 2010-2020. NAS rates increased by 105% during 2010 to 2014 and decreased by 29% during 2016 to 2020.







The median length of stay in Delaware for NAS infants has persistently increased from eight days in 2010 to 19 days in 2020 - greater than the U.S. median of 11 days.
